

ABOUT THE JOHNS CREEK SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

Now in its 17th season, the Johns Creek Symphony Orchestra is Metro Atlanta's only fully-professional, part-time symphonic orchestra, made up of professional musicians from all over the greater metro Atlanta area.

Our mission is to enhance the quality of life for Johns Creek and north Metro Atlanta residents through the presentation of high-quality performances, educational and other outreach programs that reflect the cultural diversity of the community.

GUEST CONDUCTOR

Guest Conductor John Morrison

was a fellow at Tanglewood while at Boston University for three seasons with the Boston Symphony. While there he played trumpet under the batons of Leonard Bernstein, Seiji Ozawa, Kurt Masur, Andre Previn, and Sir Colin Davis. At the behest of Maestro Bernstein, he then pursued a conducting career at the Festival at Sandpoint as a principal conductor for two seasons. He conducted the Spokane Symphony under the tutelage of MacArthur genius award winner Gunther Schuller. Maestro Schuller worked with Mr. Morrison at Tanglewood as well.
John returned to Atlanta and served as Music Director for the Atlanta Community Orchestra for five years. In 2011, John became the Artistic Director of the Georgia Philharmonic, where he served until 2022. In December 2022, John was approached by Gennadi Nedvigin to join the Atlanta Ballet as a conductor for the Nutcracker. This year he will return to conduct the Nutcracker again.

John resides in Cartersville, Georgia, with his wife Lisa, the concertmaster of the Atlanta Ballet. He is an avid cyclist who travels to Europe on cycling adventures.



MEET THE MAESTRO

Music Director J. Wayne
Baughman studied choral and
orchestral conducting, earning
undergraduate and graduate degrees
in music education from the University
of Alabama, as well as advanced
studies in conducting at the University of
Michigan.

Upon his arrival in Atlanta in 1974, Maestro Baughman immediately became involved with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and Choruses, and for 25 years he was a frequent vocal soloist, chorus member, and rehearsal conductor under the guidance of the late Robert Shaw. Well-known for his oratorio performances as bass soloist, he collaborated with Maestro Shaw on numerous projects, including

the Mozart Requiem, J.S. Bach's St. John Passion, and

Handel's Messiah. In 1990, as bass soloist, Maestro Baughman shared the honor of a Grammy Award for the Telarc recording of Belshazzar's Feast (Walton) and Chichester Psalms (Bernstein) with Robert Shaw.

Maestro Baughman has held numerous academic and church music conducting positions in a career spanning more than 50 years. In addition to his work with the Johns Creek Symphony Orchestra, he has served as President of the Cultural Arts Alliance at Johns Creek and Chair of the Johns Creek Legacy Center Task Force.

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

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KEVIN ZHU

American violinist **Kevin Zhu** has amassed an outstanding record of concert performances and competition wins since he began playing violin at age three. Praised for his "awesome technical command and maturity" (The Strad) and "absolute virtuosity, almost blinding in its incredible purity" (L'ape musicale), Kevin has performed on the world's largest stages, ranging from the Konzerthaus Berlin to London's Royal Festival Hall to the Forbidden City Concert Hall in Beijing. Initially coming to international attention after winning the 2018 Paganini Competition and 2012 Yehudi Menuhin Competition, he has established himself as a leading figure among the next generation of musicians, astonishing audiences with his peerless technical mastery and inimitable artistic voice.

In the 2022-23 season, Kevin made concerto debuts with the Des Moines Symphony and at the Auditorio Nacional in Madrid. He also performed the complete 24 Paganini Caprices at the Dresdner Musikfestspiele in Germany and at Singapore's Victoria Hall. Kevin made his Merkin Hall at Kaufman Music Center recital debut with a program inspired by ballet and opera masterpieces.

Recent performing highlights include concerts on Paganini's famed violin 'Il Cannone', concerto appearances in Gdańsk and at the historic Reggia di Caserta in Italy, and recitals in Santiago de Chile and Montréal's Salle Bourgie.

In addition to his endeavors on stage, Kevin serves as a Culture Ambassador of the Lin Yao Ji Music Foundation of China. He has been featured on ABC Eyewitness News, BBC Radio 3, and RAI Radio 3, and is the recipient of a 2021 Avery Fisher Career Grant and Salon de Virtuosi Career Grant.

Kevin holds a Bachelor's degree from The Juilliard School, where he studied with Itzhak Perlman and Li Lin. Kevin performs on the c1722 "Lord Wandsworth" Antonio Stradivari violin, which is on loan from the Ryuji Ueno Foundation and Rare Violins In Consortium, Artists and Benefactors Collaborative.





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

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
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Founded in 1960 by Carolyn P. Fleetwood, and currently under the ownership and artistic direction of her daughter, Lynn Fleetwood-Dukes, **Fleetwood Dance Center** has been in continuous operation longer than any other studio in North Atlanta.

The studio is home to the Fleetwood Dance Theatre, Inc., which was formed in 1982 as the resident performing company of the studio. Its mission is to educate and entertain through the art of dance in the north metro area of Atlanta. The company performs for a variety of special events, such as parades and pageants. Members go through an annual audition process in which they must demonstrate a broad

Nancy Gaddy has had an adventurous and eclectic career as a performing artist. As an actress, she has appeared in the national touring company of The Rocky Horror Show in addition to regional theatre and touring productions of As You Like It, Big Mother, Buried Child, Hair, Henry VI/Part I, Oh Calcutta! Out of this Furnace, Side by Side by Sondhaim, Social Security, and The King and I.

Nancy is a trained actress and singer. She attended Indiana University and received a BFA in Theatre from Southern Methodist University, and an MFA from Carnegie Mellon University. She has been an artist in residence at the Smithsonian, and she performed a series of original theatre pieces in repertory that she co-wrote and produced at the Edinburgh International Theatre Festival in Scotland.

She has appeared in numerous films and episodic television shows, including The Deer Hunter, Replicant, Dawn of the Dead, and Blade Runner, has been on-air talent for several PBS radio and television programs, plus numerous commercial spots.



DR. NATHAN FRANK

Dr. Nathan Frank hails from Humble, TX and is a

conductor, educator and singer. As a singer of both operatic and the musical theater genres, he has been heralded as a "heroic tenor with rock star appeal."

As a choral conductor, Nathan has conducted groups in Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Washington D.C, Washington State and the Czech Republic.

Before moving to the Atlanta area, Nathan held teaching positions at Southern Methodist University, University of North Texas, Southeastern Oklahoma State University, and Pacific Lutheran University. Before his career in education, Nathan was active in the musical community of Dallas-Ft. Forth Metroplex. In Dallas, he was the Associate Conductor of Schola Cantorum of Ft. Worth and the Director of Music at FUMC Plano.

He actively serves as a choral clinician and has given numerous workshops on applying Bel Canto vocal techniques to the choral palette. In addition to his work with the Johns Creek Chorale, Nathan is the artistic director of The Choral Pickup, an all-professional choral ensemble.

The Johns Creek Chorale has been guided by the vision of its creator, Dr. Nathan Frank, and performed its inaugural concert November 8, 2015.





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AWADAGIN PRATT

Among his generation of concert artists, pianist **Awadagin Pratt** is acclaimed for his musical insight and intensely involving performances in recital and with symphony orchestras. Mr. Pratt studied at the Peabody Conservatory of Music, where he became the first student in the school's history to receive diplomas in three performance areas – piano, violin, and conducting.

In 1992, Mr. Pratt won the Naumburg International Piano Competition and two years later was awarded an Avery Fisher Career Grant. Since then, he has played numerous recitals throughout the U,S., including performances at Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center, and Chicago's Orchestra Hall. His many orchestral performances include appearances with the New York Philharmonic and the Atlanta, Baltimore, St. Louis, and Detroit symphonies among many others.

Also an experienced conductor, his most recent conducting activities include play/conducting the Chamber Orchestra of Pittsburgh and conducting performances of *Porgy and Bess* for the Greensboro Opera. Mr. Pratt is currently a Professor of Piano at the College-Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati as well as the Artistic Director of the Art of the Piano Festival. In July 2023, he joined the faculty of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music as Professor of Piano.

Mr. Pratt has commissioned seven composers – Jessie Montgomery, Alvin Singleton, Judd Greenstein, Tyshawn Sorey, Jonathan Bailey Holland, Paola Prestini, and Peteris Vasks – to compose works for piano and string orchestra or

piano, string orchestra and a Roomful of Teeth. Ms. Montgomery's concerto was performed by a consortium of nine U.S. orchestras, including the St. Louis, Baltimore, Milwaukee, and Indianapolis symphonies. All seven works were recorded in summer 2022 with the chamber orchestra A Far Cry for New Amsterdam Records. During the 22/23 season, Mr. Pratt performed this concerto with 13 more orchestras, including Boston, Chicago, Minnesota, and Atlanta.

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
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
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

Hailed by the New York Times as "a voice with considerable warmth," lyric-soprano

Sarah Davis has been recognized as a gifted performer both on the recital and operatic stage.

She has premiered works by American composers John Harbison, Barbara White, Eliza Brown, Eric Nathan, and Elliott Carter at Tanglewood Music Center, SongFest, Radio France, and Network for New Music. In the month prior to the pandemic taking hold, Ms. Davis performed a glorious Liederabend at Schwartzsche Villa in Berlin, Germany, singing Canteloube, Rachmaninov, Sibelius, and Berg's Sieben Frühe Lieder with pianist Chris Cartner.

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In February 2024, she sings with the San Antonio Camerata, performing Faure's La Bonne Chanson and works by Turina and Errollyn Wallen arranged for piano quintet. Notable concert and operatic roles credits include Verdi's Requiem, Mahler's Symphony No. 2, Brahms' Requiem, Beethoven's Missa Solemnis and Ninth Symphony, Mimi in La Boheme, Antonia, Fiordiligi, Pamina, Cendrillon, Susannah (Floyd), Anne Trulove, as well as Krystyna Zyvulska from Heggie's Another Sunrise.

Sarah holds degrees from Trinity University and the Peabody Conservatory of Johns Hopkins University. She currently resides in the Texas Hill Country.

MARIA MCDANIEL

Mezzo-soprano Maria McDaniel

is consistently acclaimed for her vibrant personality, versatile repertoire, expressive passion, flexible virtuosity, and rich vocal presence on the concert, opera, and recital stages. She celebrates her 15th season of a varied vocal career as a soloist, teacher, and performance coach.

As a house favorite principal and concert artist with Atlanta Opera, Ms. McDaniel's principal role appearances include Jade Boucher in Dead Man Walking, Myrtis in Cold Sassy Tree, Second Lady in Die Zauberflöte, Flora in La Traviata, Zulma in L'Italiana in Algeri, and Giovanna in Rigoletto. She was also a member of the renowned Atlanta Opera Chorus for four seasons

while appearing regularly in private concerts and donor events. Ms. McDaniel was both Studio and Apprentice Artist during the summer seasons of the nationally recognized Chautauqua Opera in New York.

Her vocal competition winnings include the Irene Dalis Voice Competition with Opera San Jose, Winner of Women's Voice Young Artist Division National Federation of Music Clubs, Grand Prize Winner American Traditions Competition, and Southeastern Regional Finalist in the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions.





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JONATHAN YARRINGTON

A native of Idaho Falls, Idaho, **tenor Jonathan Yarrington** is Associate

Professor of Voice and Director of Opera at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Prior to joining the faculty at USM, Dr. Yarrington was a member of the Dallas Opera Studio from 2011-2014, singing nearly 100 performances in the title roles of their educational outreach productions of *Doctor Miracle* and *Jack and the Beanstalk*.

In 2012, he made his mainstage debut with Dallas Opera as The Messenger in Aida. Dr. Yarrington has sung more than 15 leading roles, including Jeník (Zápisník zmizelého) Edgardo (Lucia di Lammermoor), Jeník (Prodana nevěsta) Stage Manager (Our Town), Ferrando

(Così fan tutte), Tamino (Die Zauberflöte), Pinkerton (Madama Butterfly), and Rinuccio (Gianni Schicchi).

An active recitalist and concert performer, he has commissioned and performed new music for tenor and oboe, and he specializes in German and Czech art song.

Dr. Yarrington holds a DMA in Vocal Performance from The University of North Texas, where he studied with Dr. Stephen F. Austin. He was a student of retired Metropolitan Opera mezzo-soprano Ariel Bybee, and he won the Nebraska District of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions in 2005.

JEFFREY SNIDER

Jeffrey Snider - a native of Buffalo, New York - received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Indiana University. He received the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of North Texas in 1996, and in 1998 he returned to UNT as an associate professor in the College of Music.

Operatic roles include Lago in Verdi's Otello and Ping in Puccini's *Turandot* in concert performances at UNT, the title role in Verdi's *Falstaff* with Diversità Opera in Dallas, Scarpia in Puccini's *Tosca* with the Utah Festival Opera, "Number 8" in Conrad Susa's *Transformations* with Voices of Change, and the Count di Luna in Verdi's *Il trovatore* in El Paso.

Dr. Snider's recent appearances include Vaughan Williams' Five Mystical Songs with the Abilene Philharmonic, baritone solo in Brahms' Fin Deutsches Requiem, and the title role in Mendelssohn's Elijah at UNT. He is the baritone soloist on the Klavier recording of Orff's Carmina Burana with the UNT Wind Symphony and Grand Chorus under the direction of Eugene Migliaro Corporon. Of this performance, J. F. Weber of Fanfare magazine wrote, "this is one of the finest...male soloists I have ever heard in this work."

experience includes Sonic Generator,


